The revised Act removes the repealed sections and strengthens the Council's mandate. Registrar's Message



The Allied Health Professionals Council (AHPC) was established in 1996 under the Allied Health Professionals Act, Cap 296, with a mandate to regulate, supervise, and control the practice of Allied Health Professionals in Uganda, as well as to handle other related matters.

This is the sixth issue of the Council newsletter. It is our hope that you will find this publication informative and useful in staying up to date with AHPC activities. We encourage all our readers to share their feedback through the various communication platforms provided. Your feedback is invaluable and helps us improve service delivery to both professionals and the wider community.

The Allied Health Professionals Act (Cap 296) is operationalized by:

- The Allied Health Professionals Regulations, 2017 (Statutory Instrument No. 51),

- The Allied Health Professionals (Complaints and Disciplinary Proceedings) Regulations (S.I. No. 52), and the Allied Health Professionals (Fees) Regulations, 2021 (S.I No. 26 of 2021).

AHPC is governed by a Council appointed by the Minister of Health as outlined in the Act. Each Council serves a three-year term. The 9th Governing Council, currently chaired by Professor John Charles Okiria, commenced its tenure with inauguration by the Hon. Minister of State for Health -General Duties Hon. Anifa Kawoya Bangirana in February 2025 and will serve until December 2027. This inauguration was followed by a Corporate Governance training to provide a good foundation for the members to deliberate effectively in public interest.

The Secretariat is headed by the Registrar, supported by the Deputy Registrar and a team of 63 dedicated staff members. Over the past 29 years, AHPC has expanded significantly growing from just a Secretariat to 12 Regional Offices located in Kampala, Fort Portal, Mbarara, Masaka, Jinja, Soroti, Arua, Gulu, Lira, Hoima, Kabale, Moroto. These offices are managed by Regional Allied Health Supervisors (RAHS), supported by District Allied Health Supervisors (DAHS) and other designated supervisors in regional and national referral hospitals, as well as in the UPDF, Uganda Police Force, and Uganda Prisons Service. These roles are mandated under Section 48 of the Act.

As at 30th June 2025, AHPC had a total of 54,557 registered professionals under eight professional

boards, highlighted below:

1. Dentistry Board
2. Medical Clinical Officers Board
3. Medical Laboratory Technology Board
4. Pharmacy Board
5. Orthopedic Technology Board
6. Physiotherapy Board
7. Public Health Board
8. Radiography Board

At the inception of Council in 1996, the Council was regulating only 16 cadres of professionals, the number has since grown to 40 distinct cadres, a testament to the Council's expanding role in professional oversight.

AHPC remains committed to protecting the public from unethical and harmful practices. Over the years, we have:

- Maintained and regularly updated registers of professionals, private health units, and recognized health training institutions and published annually in the Uganda Gazette in accordance with the statutory requirement in the Act;
- Conducted routine inspections of health facilities across the country to weed out quacks;
- Sensitized both professionals and the public on regulatory requirements and professional conduct.

To further enhance efficient service delivery, the Council has procured a fleet of motor vehicles bringing the cumulative total number to 16 procured as at the year ended June 2025 to support health facility inspections and revenue mobilization efforts.

As we continue this important journey, I extend my heartfelt appreciation to all our stakeholders and partners. Your continued collaboration and support are the pillars that enable AHPC to deliver on its mandate and promote professionalism and accountability in the health sector.

Together, we shall continue to uphold high standards in Allied Health practice for the benefit of our communities.

Message from the Inspection and Quality Assurance Department



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Sound financial management and efficient administration are not just back-office functions they are the engine room that keeps the organisation moving forward.

The Department is headed by the Quality Assurance Manager supported by a team of; two (2) Senior Quality Assurance officers (SQA Diagnostic & SQA Clinical), Ten (10) Regional Allied Health Supervisors and Three (3) Focal officers, and one Quality Assurance officer-Diagnostics. There is plan to upgrade Lira Focal office to regional status effective FY 2025/26.

The department is supported by the District Health Officers/Division Medical Officers, District Allied Health Supervisors and District Laboratory Focal Persons of the districts/divisions where these activities are carried out.

Major activities handled among other include:

- Assessing the registration and licensing status of both health professional facilities and the private health facilities,
- Assessing the quality of health care in the private health units and Inspection of laboratories.
- Mentoring professionals on different aspects of quality health care/Standard Operating Procedures.
- Enforcing standards of practice

of the professional in their health units, and bringing to discipline the errant health professionals.

- Promoting improvements in public health outcomes through improving access to quality services and contributing to the fight against antimicrobial resistance (AMR).

Through continuous routine inspections, several illegal medical practitioners have been arrested, cautioned, tried in courts and others police investigations are still being carried out.

We have also registered cases of quacks at Chief Magistrate courts in Masaka, Rakai, Kyotera, Kaberamaido, Ngara, Masindi, Hoima, Kampala, Wakiso, Fort Portal.

However, the department is challenged by the delayed justice processes for reported cases especially the illegal medical practitioners who are released on bond and majority of them fail to report back to court but continue in the illegal practices.

As we continue to strive for excellence in the healthcare sector, the Registration, Licensing, Training, and Education Department remains committed to ensuring that all Allied Health Professionals, clinics, and laboratories operate at the highest standards.

Our Key Roles and Responsibilities

1. Registration and Licensing; we manage the registration and licensing processes for all Allied Health Professionals, clinics, and laboratories by ensuring that they all meet the required standards.
2. Inventory Management. We develop and maintain up-to-date inventories of registers for our professionals and health units, ensuring that all information is accurate and easily accessible.
3. Verification of Foreign-Trained Professionals. We verify and assess the qualifications of foreign trained professionals, ensuring that they meet the required standards to practice in Uganda.
4. We carry out sensitization of students and tutors on mandate
5. of AHPC & Professionalism in HTI
6. Verification of Health Workers. We verify the qualifications and registration status of health workers in both private and public health facilities.
7. Collaboration and Networking. We collaborate and network with advisory boards and associations ensuring that the pre assessment processes of professionals is handled in accordance with set standards
8. Disciplinary actions; Verification of Professionals involved in criminal offences if they are registered with valid operating licenses.



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


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
